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Community Management Meeting Summary - December 22, 2024

Participants: Ilana Peleg, Erez Peleg, Talia Arad, Yifat Segal, Ishai Levy, Kinneret Govrin, Maor Persai, Shlomo Levy, Tamir Blass, Limor Griman.

1. Presentation of the Audit Report on Planning and Infrastructure.

Invited: Uri Greenberg - Internal Auditor; Reut Shaliv, Axel Levin

The audit report, prepared during 2024, reviews the work of the Planning Committee and the management of infrastructure in the kibbutz – water, sewage, electricity, and communication. Key comments included:

- Planning: Need to integrate the planning and land areas of the entire kibbutz under the Planning Committee.

- Infrastructure: The kibbutz water network must operate according to water authority regulations.

- Energy Control: The system is outdated and does not provide consumers with the necessary information. It is recommended to invest in upgrading the electricity metering system. **Decision:** The community management accepted the report, which will be presented at the asefa.

2. Presentation of Work Plan and Budget for the Computer and Communication Sector for 2025

Maor presented the branch's structure, activities, and goals for 2025. The budget structure was also presented, including charging members for the work hours of computer and communication technicians when servicing private equipment, as is done in other service sectors (building, electricity, landscaping).

It was stated that the organisational structure and roles of the communication sector are not clear enough to the public, as well as the process for requesting services. There is room for clarity and accessibility of information.

Decision: To implement a charge of 35 NIS per hour for technician work from the communication sector when servicing members' private equipment.

(Vote: For - 6, Against - 3, Abstentions - 1)

3. Water Budget for Members' Gardens

Following a previous decision for the Yizrael kibbutz water system to operate according to water authority regulations, work was conducted to examine water expenses for irrigating private gardens, aiming to provide members with an adequate water budget for maintaining their gardens.

Criteria for defining large gardens were presented, and it was recommended to increase the budget for owners of large gardens.

Erez noted a discrepancy between actual water consumption and the amount allocated to members; for example, in 2023, members were allocated 3,000 cubic meters more than was actually consumed.

Erez proposed a new water budgeting approach with two main points:

a. Members will be credited for water consumption based on meter readings up to a recognised allocation limit. Members who consume beyond the allocation will be charged for the excess, as is currently done. Members consuming less than the allocation will only be credited based on actual consumption.

b. Owners of gardens classified as large will receive an additional 5 cubic meters each month during irrigation months.

It was said that the criteria for defining a large garden should be defined more precisely. A recommendation was made to conduct a one-year pilot, followed by an evaluation of the implications of the change.

Decision: The community management approves the proposal (after refining the criteria for large gardens) and recommends that the asefa approve it.

(Vote: For - 10, Against - 0, Abstentions - 0)

4. Utilization of Work Bonus Funds for 2024

At the end of 2023, approximately 400,000 NIS of the work bonus remained unused. After the 2024 work bonus was add and after deducting war-related expenses, 749,000 NIS remains.

A proposal was presented to reserve 49,000 NIS for unforeseen security expenses, and to use the remaining amount to cover community (kibbutz) or personal (members' bonuses) deficits.

During the discussion:

- Should the decision not be sent back to the social project team to explore ideas for funding social projects?

- It does not feel right to use this money to cover a deficit.

- This money could be added to the profit-sharing key and increase amounts across all criteria based on the proposed distribution.

- Given the community's economic situation, it is not appropriate to distribute another bonus to members.

- The current economic state is reflected in members' personal budgets.

- It is not the time to initiate and fund more community projects while trying to reduce living costs, both in the community and for individuals.

- It would be wise to reserve the money for emergencies.

At the end of the discussion, it was agreed to reserve 149,000 NIS for unforeseen security expenses.

Regarding the remaining amount of 600,000 NIS, three alternatives were agreed upon for voting:

a. Transferring the amount to the decision of the social project team.

b. Dividing the amount between bonuses for members and covering the community budget deficit.

c. Adding the amount to the profit-sharing formula for 2025.

A vote was held: For alternative A - 2, For alternative B - 6, For alternative C - 2.

Decision: The community management will recommend to the asefa to reserve 149,000 NIS from the 2024 work bonus for unforeseen security expenses and to divide the remaining amount (600,000 NIS) between covering the community budget deficit and bonuses for members.

5. Vehicle Procedure - Due to the hour, the topic was postponed to the next meeting. Summarised by: Limor Griman.



From Erez's Desk

2025 has arrived! This week we bid farewell to 2024, which will be remembered as one of the toughest years in the history of the State of Israel. We hope that in 2025, significant changes will occur in many areas, and we will begin to return to a more rational path.

The community management is preparing to deal with increasing costs against a background of certain stagnation in income. (To put it mildly – Ed) Next week, an asefa will be held to discuss the profit-sharing key. The profit-sharing key has a critical impact on the community budget and our ability to continue operating the various services in the kibbutz. Once decisions are made regarding the "KEY," we will know how to proceed with the community budget planning. I believe we will be able to present the community plan for approval by the end of January.

Renovation of the Sports Hall Building

Following the vacating of the sports hall building by Maytronics, we carried out minor preparatory work inside the building, which will allow for the operation of offices serving the community. The renovation work has been completed and the offices are now being occupied.

The functions moving to the renovated building were previously located in various buildings around the kibbutz due, to a shortage of suitable places. Receiving the sports hall building allows us to consolidate the offices in a designated and appropriate structure and free up the other buildings for their original purposes. The sports hall building also includes an open space with workstations for those in need of a workspace outside the home. There is also a meeting room and conference room.

In the near future, it will be possible to book the meeting room and conference room through Kehilanet. At this stage, those interested applying for a workstation, or using the meeting and conference rooms, are invited to contact **Hedva Shaharabani.**



Clarification on Insurance: In general, kibbutz members and their property are insured by the kibbutz; however, there are cases mentioned in the new kibbutz regulations (Takanon) that are important to highlight: "The members shall insure themselves with any appropriate insurance that covers damages that may occur to them or their dependents due to travel abroad, extreme sports, private vehicles, and the like." This means that the member has a responsibility to insure themselves in matters that are not kibbutz-related. If questions arise regarding the need for specific insurance, one can contact the insurance officer on the kibbutz – Shai Wittelson.

Cats in the Kitchen and Dining Area



There are several cats that have become accustomed to receiving food in the dining area and kitchen. Unfortunately, despite repeated warnings and the request not to feed cats in the centre of the kibbutz, there are still those who continue to feed the cats in these areas, including children as well as adults. **Please note** that there have already been two incidents of children being

scratched by cats in the rock garden area, and they required medical treatment. Additionally, the presence of cats in the dining area and kitchen poses a health hazard.

Feeding cats in the centre of the kibbutz is not allowed, even if they are very cute.

Cats can be fed in more distant areas, allowing for their care while avoiding causing a nuisance in the kibbutz centre. A very very very any any end

Cooperation is required from everyone, including children.

- Young generation living in the kibbutz.

* Residents may volunteer for duty.

* Members of retirement age may volunteer to continue performing duties.

Please Note:

- Duty swaps will be done independently.
- Update the duty coordinator after a swap.

- Provide advance notice for long vacations, reserve duty, or seasonal needs at the workplace.

Updates from the Tzemed Cluster

Absorption

Today, Friday, January 3, 2025, we are starting the personal interview phase for candidates for absorption into the kibbutz for the summer of 2026. Interviews will be conducted every Friday from 8:00 AM to 1:00 PM, starting today and continue until February 21, 2025. A total of 14 couples will be interviewed. A big thank you to the interviewing team that volunteered for this important and demanding task! * We are already beginning the first stage in the screening process for the summer 2027 absorption. During the months of January to March, we will conduct three Zoom meetings for all those interested in joining the kibbutz. In these calls, we will explain about the kibbutz and its communal lifestyle, the pre-absorption process, and there will be an opportunity for questions from the interested parties. The dates of the calls are published on the kibbutz's website and on the website of the kibbutz movement.

* Recently, the committee completed its work on updating the absorption agreement. All candidates currently in the process, received the new agreement and were asked to sign it, along with the signature of the kibbutz secretary.

* In light of the new regulations coming into effect, an update was made to the integration procedure regarding the termination of the process. (See "Procedures on Kehilanet)

Housing

* Following the asefa's approval to use the additional apartment that was renovated in the Zachat moadon for internal needs, it was decided that the Kagan family, Keren & Doron, and their three children will move into this apartment, and they will be neighbours with Shimrit and Dagan Meir, and their three children. The renovation of the building is expected to be completed by the end of the month.

* **Avi Shani** will receive Judy Court's apartment and the small apartment adjacent to it as one permanent unit. The unification and renovation of the building will only take place upon receiving the budgetary approvals for the project.

Young Generation

* The change in the "employee" track in community sectors, approved by the community management last month, came into effect at the beginning of the new year. The hourly wage rates in the various sectors have been published to the young generation. The young generation procedure has been updated in accordance with this change. (See "Procedures" on Kehilanet)

Rotem Hillel - Touch in Emotion


The year 2024 was a year that brought a lot of pain and trauma. In my work at the clinic and through volunteering, I met reservists, spouses of reservists, mothers of soldiers, women who were evacuated from their homes in the south and north, and many women who experienced stress and anxiety. We all, in a sense, lost the safe space we had before October 2023. The pain I encountered manifested emotionally or physically, and in most cases, it was both.

However, there were also happy moments filled with joy. Life is stronger than anything, and we continue despite the war and the hostages who should be home. I hold great hope that 2025 will bring significant change. Thanks to my studies in body psychotherapy, this year I continued to deepen my knowledge and understanding of the topic that interests me most—body-mind. How the mind affects the body and how the body affects the mind.

My aspiration in therapy is to connect individuals to their pains, bodily sensations, and rising emotions, with the aim of giving them space, time, and a safe environment. Through acknowledging them, movement, change, and hopefully healing become possible. I mainly accompany women of all ages in dealing with physical and mental changes related to our life experiences as women.

In my treatments, I combine touch with conversation and energetic tools like Bach flowers and healing. The treatment can be focused on recharging energy when needed or as a deep process for those wishing to create significant change. (The touch includes oil massage, deep tissue massage, medical massage, hot stone massage, massage combined with cupping, or a Thai massage integrated with Thai acupressure).

Starting in January, the prices of the treatments will be updated, as will the treatment durations. A regular treatment will now last one hour and fifteen minutes, and for those needing additional time, the treatment will continue for one and a half hours. I am here to offer you a safe space where you can connect with yourself, renew your strength, and undergo a significant process—at your own pace and in your own way. I would be happy to talk or meet. Yizrael, today, is a settlement with a very stable population, with members living, in many cases, in the same homes for forty or fifty years.

It wasn't always like this. In the 1950s, 60s, and 70s, there was a significant turnover, and only after many people leaving us in the 1980s did this blessed period of stability begin.

I guess that over 3,000 people have passed through Yizrael, not counting volunteers



and other temporary groups. This means that for every person currently on Yizrael, at least five more have left. It's a bit hard to remember them all. In the archives, I try to find the names of everyone who was here. The historical record from the beginning of the kibbutz until the 1980s was probably discarded a long time ago; there is a record that starts in the 1980s. From various sources, we have reached the names of people who were in Yizrael from 1948, and to date, we

have reached 2,300.

In the estate of Dorit Fink, I found songs she wrote in 1965 for the wedding of David and Brenda Milstein.

I found Brenda on Facebook, sent her the songs, and asked her to write memories from the time in YIzrael. This is how I discovered the story of the **Smith family**, a couple from Australia and their six children:

The eldest daughter, Helen, arrived with her partner Moishe Gold on Yizrael in 1958 with the Ginnegar group. Here, their three children, Eran, Eilat, and Galya, were born.

In 1962, their second daughter, Rita, arrived with her partner Eddie Kovner, born in Harbin, China, who grew up in Australia, and their eldest son was born on Ylzrael. In 1964, their parents Albert and Beatrice (Betty) sent Brenda, then 16, Dan, then 18, and Ben, then 12, to join their sisters in the kibbutz. A few months later, they also arrived on Ylzrael. Last to arrive, that same year, was their son Philip, who stayed for a short time. He met Rachel here, a soldier who was then on the kibbutz; he left with her and later they got married.

Albert was 51 and Betty was 50, very unusual in a settlement where the oldest members were 35. It can be assumed that it was not easy for an older Australian couple to adapt to the harsh conditions of those days, and it was also difficult for the young kibbutzniks, who saw them as very old.

In 1965, Brenda married David Milstein, born in South Africa, a member of the Alon garin. She was 17, perhaps the youngest bride in the history of YIzrael. Their son Ilan was born on YIzrael. Steve Blass recounts about David: "As a student in Pretoria, he lived in the student dormitories. The students marked his door and the way to his room with swastikas."

Helen and Moishe Gold left to live on Moshav Regba. When I (Jules) was on Machon on Yizrael in 1967, Albert and Betty and four of their sons were still here.

Rita and Eddie Kovner left for Jerusalem. Brenda and David Milstein returned to Australia and live near Brisbane. After their children left, Albert and Betty also had to leave and moved to Jerusalem, where Albert passed away in 1973.

A family story. Were their dreams shattered here?

I went to ask several of the older members what they remember. They barely remember the Smith family. I couldn't find anyone who remembers the names of the parents or how many sons they had. This raises reflections how many years do you need to be on Yizrael for people to remember you? In the end, is our fate to be forgotten? Jules Feldman




