In the current Israeli reality of this year, drops of hope lead only to a flood of filth on the shores of the sea.

Asefa Report - 16/09/2024

Internal audit report on the organisational structure of the business sector.

Uri Greenberg, the internal auditor, presented the report he prepared in January 2024. The full report is available in the mazkirut for public review, and a summary of the report was sent via Kehilanet as background material for the asefa.

The auditor noted several contradictions between the organisational structure document and the bylaws of the holding corporation. The management of the corporation is in the process of resolving these contradictions. The auditor thanked the officials for their cooperation during the audit process.

Economic Council Report - 16/09/2024

1. Presentation and approval of the financial reports of the kibbutz, the holding corporation, and the agricultural corporation.

Maor Persai Bar-Niv, the financial manager, presented the reports prepared by the accounting firm "Brit Pikuach."

Decisions:

1. The Economic Council approves the financial reports of the kibbutz for the year 2023.

2. The Economic Council approves the registering of the profits according to Section 62 of the tax laws. (The council received a complicated explanation. This decision will save the kibbutz on tax – Ed)

3. The Economic Council approves the employment of "Brit Pikuach" as the accountants for our various associations.

The decisions were passed - 22 in favour, 0 against, 0 abstentions.

Community Management Meeting Summary

15 September 2024

Participants: Erez Peleg, Ilana Peleg, Talia Arad, Yifat Segal, Kinneret Govrin, Maor Persai Bar-Niv, Stas Gavrilov, Tamir Blass, Limor Griman.

1. Information and Miscellaneous:

Last weekend, a member of the kibbutz held a private party at the pool, which included an overnight stay at the agricultural farm. The event was only partially coordinated and the relevant information was lacking. It exceeded the reasonable limits of private use of public spaces and violated kibbutz regulations. The case is being

investigated with the relevant officials and the member who organised it. This incident will require us to clarify our procedures to maintain our daily life and well-being in the kibbutz. We view this seriously and condemn the act and the behaviour prior to the event. (See separate condemnation – Ed)

2. Concluding the Ad Hoc Team's Work on Increasing Community Income Sources

(Invited: Uri Gilad and Eviatar Assaf - Absorption Committee):

Erez presented the team's conclusions, which were presented in the economic council meeting on August 12, 2024, and already published in the newsletter.

A discussion ensued regarding the main issues arising from the team's conclusions:

- Absorption of about 6 families per year starting in 2026.
- Various opinions were raised regarding Kibbutz Yizrael's social capacity to absorb so many families annually, emphasising the need to prepare the community for such a campaign —involving members in the process and the various roles derived from it.
- It was noted that the target is very ambitious, challenging, and perhaps unrealistic. Conversely, it was argued that without setting ambitious goals, we would not succeed in moving forward. The role of the programme is not to determine what can and is possible to do but to build and lead a successful absorption process.
- It was suggested to clearly define the kinds of families we want to accept, the precise parameters for acceptance, and how they support income growth, noting that alongside income, there will also be an increase in expenses.
- Representatives from the Absorption Committee mentioned that a new parameter has been introduced in the selection process, examining the income potential of new members based on their employment status and average salary prior to acceptance.
- It was proposed to assess the earning potential of couples as a family unit.
- Management committee members also expressed doubts about the kibbutz's ability to meet the acceptance target concerning housing conditions.
- In response, it was stated that the plan for northern housing has been delayed but still meets the required timelines for implementing the acceptance program— construction of the first 10 apartments is expected to be completed by January 2026, and the second phase, including an additional 12 apartments, is to be completed by December 2026.

Decisions Made:

- The community management instructs the Growth Cluster to absorb 6 families each year from 2026 to 2030.
- The community management instructs the Growth Cluster that at least 50% of the new members' income should be high.
- Emphasis on completing the northern neighbourhood by the end of 2028.
- The community management instructs the Reserve Fund to explore how to increase transfers to the kibbutz from pensioners.
- The community management instructs the Management and Development Department to present a plan to enhance earning potential and actual income.
- The community management recommends increasing allocations from business profits for the benefit of the community budget.

3. Management of the Water System According to Water Authority Regulations (Guest - Eddie Solow)

Currently, Kibbutz Yizrael's water system is not managed according to the mandatory guidelines of the Water Authority. It was clarified in various forums that management not in accordance with Water Authority regulations exposes the kibbutz to the risk of losing its water supply license and transferring water supply management to the regional corporation "Kolkhi Gilboa."

In reviewing the water management, it is necessary to separate the management of the water system according to Water Authority regulations from the water budgeting mechanism for members.

To comply with Water Authority regulations, we must calculate the cost of water consumption for members according to the Water Authority's tariff book. Based on the price per cubic meter of water, the Water Authority defines amounts designated for the operation and rehabilitation of the water system.

Maor presented a financial model for transitioning to operating the water system according to the regulations and its implications for members and sectors, stemming from changes in water tariffs.

According to the model and the current budgeting method in the kibbutz, members consuming water as allocated will not notice a change. Members who consume more than their allocation **will pay slightly more** than they currently do, while those consuming less will have a bit more remaining in their water budget than they do now.

Edde presented his view regarding the water budgeting model for members, suggesting we assess water consumption on an annual basis, estimate the amount of water consumed by each member, and credit them only for what they consumed—essentially eliminating water budgeting as a source for increasing personal budgets. Additionally, he proposed creating a water budgeting mechanism for maintaining members' gardens based on the size of the garden, aiming to allow garden owners to cultivate them and avoiding incentives to neglect their gardens.

In the discussion, management members addressed several issues:

- The role of private ornamental gardens in the visibility of public space and their impact on the character of the place and quality of life.
- There is no necessity to link the management of the water system with the budgeting of water for members.
- Aligning the operation of the water system with the Water Authority regulations will result in certain changes in costs for members who exceed their water allocation, which should be approved in the asefa/economic council as part of the 2025 budget approval.

Public Condemnation for Improper Conduct

"Last weekend, a Kibbutz member held a private party at the pool, which included an overnight campout at the agricultural farm. The event exceeded the reasonable limits of private use of public spaces, violating the regulations of the kibbutz. **We view this matter seriously and condemn the member's conduct.**

We would like to emphasise that the kibbutz is not a hotel or a vacation village that can be rented out. Any use of the kibbutz facilities that is not for private family purposes requires the approval of the community manager, in order to avoid cases of illegal use that may expose the kibbutz to proceedings with state authorities.

It is strictly prohibited to hold events at the pool where alcohol is served. It is also strictly prohibited to hold commercial events (where participants are charged) in the kibbutz facilities.

From Erez's Desk



Opening Remarks These transitional days, at the start of the school year and the anticipation of the new year, are normally days of renewal and hope. This year feels different. For nearly a year, we have been living in the reality of war, under the constant feeling that it could escalate and intensify at any moment. The school year in high schools has either started or not started, our soldiers, both active and reservists, are "stretched" to their limits in their efforts to defend us, the government is generating uncertainty about our future, and above all, 101 of our people are still hostages in the hands of Hamas in Gaza.

Despite all this, we do not have the option to sink into despair. We must look ahead and continue our daily lives as far as possible. I wish for all of us that this year will be one of positive change. That our hostages will return soon, that we will manage to look forward with hope, see blessings in our actions, and remember that in many cases, the future depends on us—on our unity and how we conduct ourselves. Wishing everyone a good year.

1. Security The section on security, below, is copied word for word from the publication in the newsletter on June 21, 2024. Unfortunately, nothing has changed. However, it is important to read and refresh our preparedness:

“The State of Israel has been at war on multiple fronts since October 7, 2023, and we understand that it is not going to end soon. The winds of war, as reflected in the media, herald an intensification of fighting on the northern front and probably also on other fronts, including one that is only five kilometers away from us.

It is true that we believe that at least against the rocket threat, our community is not a prime target. However, the current war is unlike previous wars, both in terms of its duration, the number of concurrent active fronts, and the types of weaponry used by our enemies. In light of all this, we must take into account that we, in our community, may also experience events that require defense.

Our emergency response team is prepared to respond to various scenarios, and we are constantly assessing the situation with the relevant security authorities. I urge everyone to go over the defensive guidelines in case of alerts. The guidelines are available on the Home Front Command website and also on Kehilanet. I hope that we will not need to engage in defensive actions, but we must be prepared for any eventuality.”

2. Safety

The issue of safety periodically arises, particularly concerning the use of vehicles within the community. This time, our focus is on parking vehicles along the paths within the community. Parking vehicles alongside the paths poses a significant danger to pedestrians, especially children.

It is true that designated parking spaces are not immediately adjacent to everyone's homes, but parking is only allowed in those areas. In Kibbutz Yizrael, there is no definition of private parking or parking allowed near residential homes, except in very rare cases defined for health reasons and for a limited time.

Parking alongside the paths obstructs the movement of vehicles, which are forced to drive on the sidewalk to pass, thereby endangering pedestrians. Furthermore, vehicles parked alongside the paths block the line of sight for drivers and pedestrians, especially children who may appear suddenly in the middle of the path. It is understandable that sometimes passengers or cargo need to be dropped off closer to home—this is acceptable for a limited time. **I urge all drivers and vehicle owners to park their vehicles only in the designated parking areas.**

3. Preparations for Winter

The transitional season is at hand, and we have begun our preparations for the winter season. Meteorologists predict that autumn and winter will be characterized by more severe weather events—strong winds and heavy rains for short periods. These weather patterns carry the potential for causing damage. The community's preparations include strengthening poles and removing items that could be blown away in strong winds, opening drainage channels, and cleaning drainage pipe inlets, professionally examining trees, and performing preventive pruning to reduce the likelihood of branch collapses.

I suggest that everyone check their home surroundings and do everything possible to strengthen and prevent items from being blown away, as well as to prevent flooding and water entering homes.

As part of the preparations, as in every autumn, **street cleaning will take place on September 27** by the council using a truck with a sweeper. On this day, we request that vehicles be removed as much as possible from the edges of the sidewalks so that the truck can reach and clean all the corners. Additionally, spot repairs to asphalt on damaged road sections are planned for these days. On September 29, the building branch will carry out road painting with an emphasis on safety—crosswalks, speed bumps, stop lines, and also lane dividers on main roads.

4. Project Progress

- The Northern Neighbourhood – Yesterday, Thursday 19.9.24, the process of receiving bids from construction contractors was completed. After selecting the contractor, the project of building the first 10 units of the Northern Neighborhood was begun.
- Building in the Young Generation Housing– The building is under construction. Estimated completion date of the project – February 2025.
- Food Branch Project – The project of replacing the dishwasher and renovating the washing room has been completed. We are currently in the stage of preparing the plans for the continuation of the kitchen renovation project.

Renewed Enjoyment at the Yizrael Spring - Eddie Solow

Have you been to the Yizrael Spring recently, or like me, were you disgusted by the filth so you travelled great distances in search of clean sites? If so, I have good news for my fellow nature and water lovers on Yizrael.

For several months now, every day at six in the morning, a contractor worker from Kfar Kana arrives and cleans the place. He brings tools from home, collects dirt down to the tiniest piece of plastic and bottle top, trims nearby bushes so they don't serve as toilets, removes toilet paper and wipes, scrubs the tables, sweeps leaves with a broom from home, uses a blower where needed. He even enters the water to take out plastic bags and bottles. The place is as clean as a whistle... (until the people arrive and prepare him work for the next day...) Hatem doesn't give up. I was sure he would get sick of it and leave the job quickly, like his predecessors. But not Hatem. He comes to work 30 days a month **and works**.

How do I know all this? I often come to the spring to refresh myself in the water for a few minutes, after walking and riding in our fields, before the hard climb back to the kibbutz. At first, I didn't talk to him. I thought he probably didn't know Hebrew; otherwise, why would he work at such a job? I thought he would soon not be around. It turns out I too have preconceptions.

After a few days of observing him from afar, I realised there was something special about this man. He is old like me. I was curious to learn more about him. One day I plucked up courage and approached him. I complimented him on the quality of his work and attention to detail. He beamed with pleasure and replied to me in excellent

Hebrew. He invited me for a cup of coffee, and told me about himself. We exchanged views about the behaviour of our fellow countrymen. It turns out he had worked for years as a waiter in Tel Aviv until his back gave out. He lived for two years in the village on social security, and of course, other health problems began to plague him. He underwent two heart catheterizations and more, and then concluded that if he didn't return to work, he would die soon. Therefore, he offered his services to a contractor who cleans for the JNF, and since then, we have been enjoying the renewal of our spring.

So folks, leave through the Almond Gate, on foot or by bike, by car or club car. Enter the crystal-clear waters, drink coffee, or have a picnic under the eucalyptus trees. I recommend the cool early morning hours. It's better not to go on Saturdays or holidays. My family from the centre of Israel spent time there last Friday, and everyone enjoyed it, both children and adults alike.

Delving in the Archives – Jules Feldman

Kudos to the Memoir Writers! In Yizrael, we have been blessed with quite a few members who have written memoirs. Most of them edited by Dina Bookman. (More accurately Dina wrote and edited and produced! - Ed)

There is great importance in family or community narratives. In these narratives, we talk about successes and failures, about difficult times and good times. A child who grows up with a community or family story grows up with the confidence that difficulties can be overcome.

Ziva Bir (1933-2016) arrived in Yizrael in 1950, with the Tel Gezer Garin. The following are excerpts from her memoirs, in her unique style:

The Bell. In Yizrael, there was always a special atmosphere. Under the old dining room hut, there is a bell [referring to the bell now placed next to the stone circle, on the eastern side of the hut]. Once, they would ring it at six in the morning to wake people up. Before that, we had a phonograph we found in the Arab village. Actually, it wasn't called a phonograph, but a gramophone. It had a handle and a large horn, and there were two records we found. In the morning, (until they thought of the bell idea) the guard, before going to sleep, would turn the handle, switch it on, and call into the speaker: "Good morning, Chaverim! Good morning!" But this bell served us in other areas. When a baby girl or boy was born, they would ring the bell and announce to the whole kibbutz: a girl has been born to..." (or a boy!) That's how it was. Everyone shared in the experience. They received the baby and did everything; there was no such thing as a lack of joy. This meant that everyone was involved in this affair. That was our life. Today, the bell exists as a memento.

Caring for Babies When our first babies were born, we were young, busy establishing the kibbutz. Suddenly, we had to take care of children, but we were inexperienced and didn't know what to do! Just as the movement helped us in other areas and sent us instructors – for example, an agriculture instructor from Ginnegar – it also sent us a caregiver, also from Ginnegar. Her name was Mania. She explained a

few things to us. At that time, in all the kibbutzim, we had communal sleeping arrangements in children's houses.

Doctor. From time to time, a doctor from Geva would come to check on the children and check the mothers to see if they had milk. I think he came with a donkey and a cart. Other than that, I don't remember that we went to the doctor. We didn't need a doctor in the early years. We were all healthy and strong. Young. We didn't think about those things.

Living Conditions in the Huts At first, we lived in wooden huts. The huts came without stairs because they didn't know in advance how they would be placed. We decided that the huts should be a bit elevated so that some air could come in... and to prevent various crawling things from getting in. So, we built the huts above ground and added stairs. Each hut had a small entrance room and the main living area. In the small room, there was a sink in the corner. The hut had, I think, four rooms (four living units). Between every two rooms, there were two small alcoves, one for a toilet and one for a shower. But they never installed a shower or a toilet!

But what did they do with them? They made shelves, and they became closets for work clothes.
