Education Council Meeting Summary (February 11, 2025)

Participants: Limor Griman, Noga Harpaz, Avishag Sharoni, Neta Blass, Nir Baor, Adi Goldstein-Ilan, Yael Ouster, Sarit Laviv, Gal Witelson (Observer).

Agenda:

1. Updates and Congratulations

- Limor congratulated Noga on her appointment as the Education Cluster Manager (official start in September) and welcomed Gal as an observer on the council.

2. Issue of Number of Children in Kindergartens

- Yael Ouster presented the issue regarding the required number of children in the Rimon and Alon kindergartens, highlighting that over 37 children are needed to maintain both.

- Currently, there is a low interest in the kindergartens, from parents of outside children in the crèches, necessitating the admission of more outside children to meet these numbers.

- The council debated whether to maintain both kindergartens or merge them into one multi-age kindergarten.

- Recommendation: Keep the current setup and avoid a multi-age kindergarten, anticipating an increase in child numbers due to planned absorption of new families.

- Decision implications include increasing the number of children in creches and exploring transition options between Rimon and Alon.

3. Housing in the Chevra Bogeret

- The issue of housing for the Chevra Bogeret was raised, with a need for a structured discussion.

- The council is responsible for leading community discussions to determine if the current model is suitable for 2025 and what changes, if any, are required.

- Points discussed included building alternatives, involving youth in the process, the role of educational staff, and timing for decision-making.

- **Decision:** Conduct discussions in parallel to evaluate options and establish a small team to develop a process and timeline.

Conclusions:

- A small team will be formed to propose a structured process for community discussions on housing decisions.

- The education council will seek community leadership input on when the final decisions will be made.

In the Rehabilitation branch, two retired kibbutz members are volunteering: Aviva Beutler and Biff Markham-Oren.

Biff and Aviva provide advice to cluster teams in the areas of rehabilitation, mobility, and suitable adaptations in the home. They visit members' homes to assess individual assistive devices and rehabilitation aids, and they are members of the Health Council.

Additionally, Biff and Aviva volunteer in their respective fields in Or B'Givah.

- Biff - Physiotherapist, treating kibbutz members in their third age.

- Aviva - Occupational therapist, treating kibbutz members in their third age.

Here are a few clarifications regarding these treatments:

- Treatments will be provided only for those aged 75+ and only with a doctor's referral.

- Treatments will be prioritised for members who are not mobile and have difficulty in leaving the kibbutz for treatments.

- Treatments will be offered based on the availability of Aviva and Biff, as they manage their own schedules.

- Referrals to Biff and Aviva will be made by the clinic or the third-age team.

- Based on their professional judgment and after assessment, sometimes the recommendation will be for continued treatment outside the kibbutz rather than with them.

- Residents aged 75+ and/or parents wishing to receive treatment from Biff or Aviva will be charged a minimal fee of 35 NIS per session. This is not a payment for the treatment but a minimal participation fee for clinic maintenance, professional liability insurance, etc. This will be charged via the taktziv only (no cash).

- Services will be provided based on availability and vacant slots only.

We take this opportunity to thank Aviva and Biff on behalf of the Health and Welfare Cluster teams, who benefit greatly from their assistance (even outside working hours), and on behalf of the many kibbutz members who knowingly (or unknowingly) gain from their professional knowledge and support.

Participants: Erez Peleg, Tamar Sanker, Paul Zelas, Amos Shemi, Raz-Council Inspector, Ahmad-Environmental, Quality Officer.

The purpose of the meeting is to understand how to reduce environmental pollution and address nuisances. Our intention is to organise recycling so that we can inform the public about regular and structured collection days to raise awareness and encourage participation.

For the residents of the northern neighbourhood, two designated recycling centres have already been constructed, which will operate upon the start of the neighbourhood's occupancy. According to the inspector, compared to other settlements in the council, Yizrael is managed independently and effectively.

Electronic Waste Collection: A new company is expected to start collecting this type of waste. Currently, there is one collection point near the drum shelter. We need to find an additional point for the convenience of the members, which will be coordinated together with the Planning Committee.

Blue Bins for Paper: Labels have been placed on the bins to improve the sorting of paper and cardboard.

Small Paper Stations in Offices: Paul is responsible for collecting and transferring materials to the cardboard compactor at Maytronics.

Metal Collection (cans and containers): Unfortunately, this is currently not possible in the council.

Glass Collection: (jars and glass containers): There are two designated stations in purple, located near the drum shelter and the kolbo.

The black barrels located around the bins are designated for glass bottles only. We intend to also place containers for collecting all plastic and glass bottles that can be redeemed.

Plastic Collection: (Except for pesticide containers!) Currently, all plastic recycling – food containers, various plastic items, including plastic bags – is done in the yellow cages. Everything is collected and sent to the Amnir corporation, where it undergoes structured sorting. The council is very eager to introduce orange bins for the residents, but due to the socio-economic conditions in our area, there are significant gaps in public awareness regarding recycling. If sorting is not done properly, the council will face hefty fines, which is a concern. There is an intention to start a pilot programme with strong communities like ours, likely later this year.

Yard Waste Collection and Shredding for Ground Cover: This is the responsibility of the Gardening Branch (Noi).

Electricity Consumption from Clean Sources: According to Erez, about 40% of our electricity consumption is produced in-house through solar panels!

It should be noted that through the solar panels, we also enjoy hot water in the laundry and in the food sector!

In conclusion, this week a call for proposals will be issued by the "Green Network" for an environmental quality support project. Settlements in the council are invited to develop a structured program in their community that enhances environmental quality and will receive 10,000 NIS . We will hold a joint meeting with Shachar, Axel, and Erez, where we will try to produce a suitable plan.

And one more thing: The committee wishes to express heartfelt thanks and great appreciation to:

-Paul Zelas – for sorting bottles and plastics.

-Akiva Greenberg – for sorting paper from the offices.

These are two hardworking members who have been diligently working for decades, in heat and cold, to maintain the quality of our lives and the environmental cleanliness of our kibbutz.

Update from the Housing Committee

Two tenders for permanent apartments.

- Maida will move into the parents' housing in the house that belonged to Aviva Beutler (senior). The house will undergo renovations before her move.

- Natalie Baum will move into the house of the late Shirley Markham in the parents' housing.

We are opening two tenders for permanent apartments. Applications for the apartments must be submitted in writing to the Housing Committee by March 7, 2025. The offered apartments are:

1. The late Gavrush Nechustan's apartment in the Sadot neighborhood, 110 m². The apartment was built less than 15 years ago. Prior to the entry of new tenants, painting and necessary repairs only, will be undertaken.

2. The late Nis Albocher's apartment in the Eastern neighbourhood, along with the adjacent apartment currently occupied by Ya'akov Sasbon. The two apartments will be merged into one apartment of 110 m². (The late Nis' apartment has two levels, , the ground level is 80 m² and the lower level is be 30 m²). This is an older apartment that requires new architectural planning and extensive renovation.

The tenders are now open, with the knowledge of Maida and Ya'akov, even before they leave their apartments, in order to advance processes that are important for the members of the kibbutz and for absorption.

Members interested in viewing the apartments are requested to contact one of the committee members to coordinate the visit, and not to coordinate directly with the tenants.

Zimra's Column

Love for the Land

Indeed, **Tu B'Shvat** was a week ago, but the blossoming trees are still around us, and the spring flowers are blooming in the meadows surrounding Yizrael. "For there is hope for a tree; if it is cut down, it will sprout again, and its shoots will not cease" (Job 14:7).

The tree represents a rare and awe-inspiring combination of permanence and change. Rooted in its place, its movements are limited and dependent on external influences of wind and water. On the other hand, the tree grows, buds, sheds its leaves, and gets covered, bearing flowers and fruit—there is life in it that involves motion. The tree serves as a foundational cultural element in all civilizations. The trees were here before us, a symbol of growth and the passage of time. Tu B'shvat is particularly known as the planting holiday. The act of planting connects a person to the earth of their homeland, linking the planter in the present with future generations. Planting with the knowledge that "there is hope for a tree" gives us the opportunity to send roots into the future, but more than that—it is a profound expression of faith that there is a tomorrow, and thus it is our duty to care for it.

It is fascinating to find these relevant words in the 'Planting Scroll' of Kibbutz Kfar Etzion, written in 1944:

"Generation after generation, we plant and build, and even when winds threaten to uproot the tree, we will continue to plant, to grow, to blossom, and to bear fruit. We need rootedness, a firm grip on the land of our homeland. And this is the work we do in this place.

These trees we plant today will serve as a symbol for us, a symbol of our path as pioneers of the land, a sign of our covenant with the land of our homeland. 'For man is like a tree of the field.' The deep roots of the trees will remind us of our duty to be connected to the world of action, in building, planting, and working. The high branches that reach up will inspire us to look upward, to know our essence, and to always strive for moral perfection and the sanctity of life. This is the way of our ancient ancestors, and this is our path..."

This led to a loud argument with several passengers. All I wanted at that moment was to hide under my seat because it was very uncomfortable and embarrassing. Suddenly, gentle and calming guitar sounds emerged from a local troubadour. A nice guy sitting next to us remarked that this was the most bizarre journey he had ever experienced.

From there, the atmosphere calmed down, the train arrived at the station in Afula, where our parents picked us up to take us home, bringing to an end, a long day. Another successful Bar Mitzvah mission is behind us.



Wishing us all calm days, good news, and the swift return of all the hostages. That is the most important thing right now.








Delving in the Archives


