Guy (grandson) I wish I could be there with you all today, but I'm here in spirit—just like Safta would be if she weren't too busy up there, settling in to watch the tennis.

Safta was, without a doubt, one of a kind. She lived her life with sharp wit, fierce determination, and a deep love for her family. She didn't just talk about doing the right thing—she expected it, lived by it, and made sure the rest of us tried to as well. And while her moral compass occasionally clashed with my tattoos and pierced ears (as a teenager), I always knew that beneath the disapproval, there was love. Deep, unwavering love, even if it came with a side-eye.

Some of my best memories of her are the quiet, simple ones. Sitting around playing Scrabble with her and Saba—where you had to earn your win because she never let anything slide. Visiting their home in Herne Bay, a place that felt like a little world of its own, filled with warmth, laughter, and a pinch of stern wisdom. Watching her at her

printing press, where she poured herself into her craft, as focused and precise as she was about everything in life.

And, of course, hearing her call me "Pet." It was such a small word, but when she said it, it carried so much love, with just a hint of "don't get cheeky."

And then there was tennis. Safta didn't play—though if she had, she probably would have been amazing—but she loved to watch. Tennis wasn't just a sport to her; it was a passion. She followed it with the kind of intensity that made it feel like an event, even if you weren't watching.

I'm so grateful that she got to meet all three of my kids. Seeing her surrounded by her great-grandchildren was something truly special. She loved them with the same fierce devotion she showed all of us. And while she might have softened a little in her later years, that twinkle in her eye—equal parts love and just a bit of judgment—never faded. Family was everything to her, and here, in this space today, full of all of us, is proof of that.

Safta, thank you—for your wisdom, your humour, and your love. Thank you for teaching me the value of fairness, the strength of standing by your principles, and the importance of keeping just a little mischief in life. You've left us all with memories we'll carry forever.

Rest easy, Pet. You've earned it. And wherever you are now, I hope the TV is on, the players are on court, and you've got the best seat in the house.

Francis (grandson) For those of you who don't know me, I'm Francis, Shirley's grandson. I'd like to share a few memories of Safta with you today—snapshots of her visiting us here in Canberra, from our visits to her in Israel, of moments of connection that stand out across 40 years.

The very first visit, of course, I can't remember. But I know she was there, holding me as a newborn. The first memory I do have must have been when I was about three or four. I distinctly remember thinking she was impossibly old. Little did I know how wrong I was—she was probably 65!

Back then, through the eyes of a small child, Safta was a curious mix of awe and terror. I'd wait, holding my breath, for her and Saba to arrive, frantically wondering if my table manners would pass muster. They often didn't. But beyond that, I remember her warmth, her complete attentiveness, and how—even as a small boy—I could tell that she really saw me.

One of my favourite memories is from waking up in her house on the kibbutz after we'd flown in from the airport. I must have been five or six. That visit was when I first discovered her unexpected, mischievous sense of humour, which only came out when you least expected it. I'll never forget Mum's face when Safta, in a bid to make us kids smile for a group photo, casually flashed her knickers at the grandkids. Mum was mortified. We were delighted. Safta? Totally unbothered.

There's so much more to say about the Safta I grew to know over the years. Her grace and dignity, which seemed completely effortless. Her artistic talents were astonishing. Her surprising love of tennis. The sense of constancy about her.

And at the center of it all, I'll remember her warmth, her kindness, and her love. She was extraordinary in all the ways that really matter, and I feel so lucky to have had her in my life.

To our Mums - Jude, Sal and Biffy- you are exceptional women and daughters, we are very proud to be part of this legacy and will forever surround you with love, just as you did for Safta.

Community Management Meeting Summary - 1.12.2024

Participants: Ilana Peleg, Erez Peleg, Talia Arad, Yifat Segal, Ishai Levi, Kinneret Govrin, Maor Persai Bar-Niv, Stas Gavrilov, Tamir Blass, Limor Griman.

Agenda:

- 1. Information and Miscellaneous
 - a. Clarification on how to bring issues to the kibbutz asefa:

The kibbutz regulations (Takanon Hakibbutz) state that topics should be brought to the asefa by the management committee, community management, or Yizrael Holdings Management. Currently, there are topics that come directly to the asefa via bodies or committees operating under the authority of the community management, such as the absorption committee, the search committee for office bearers, and the committee staffing committee.

It is required that the community management be informed about the topics to be discussed in the asefa before they are published. The schedule for the planned asefot is shared with community management members, so they can view it. If necessary, community management will convene on issues brought to the asefa by the committees.

b. Talia Arad raised concerns about safety hazards at the entrance area of the dining room, which could pose risks to kibbutz residents and employees.

Decision: To instruct the planning committee to draw up a plan to provide a solution and include it in the investment request.

2. Protection of Members' Homes - Continued Discussion (Mamadim)

Following the presentation of the survey results, a discussion took place regarding the feasibility of executing a project for members' homes that do not have a protected space.

On one hand, there is a desire for all members in YIzrael to feel secure during times of war and security challenges, and on the other hand, the kibbutz's ability to finance such a project, which costs 14 million NIS, is limited.

Community management members understand the feelings of members whose homes lack a protected space; however, based on assessment of the Home Front Command and other security agencies, Kibbutz Ylzrael is in a "non-threatened" area, therefore there is no justification for undertaking a project at such a high cost at this stage. If members wish to reinforce a room in their homes at their own expense, the kibbutz will assist in introducing them to the contractor in an effort to reduce costs.

Decision: No protection project for members' homes will be carried out at the expense of the kibbutz.

(Voting: In favour - 9, Against - 0, Abstentions - 0)

3. Presentation of the Security Committee Work Plan and Budget for 2025 (Invited: Eyal Tirosh)

Eyal reviewed the committee's activities in 2024, which were primarily influenced by the war and presented the Security Committee's work plan for 2025.

The requested budget is approximately 15% lower than the 2024 plan, mainly due to a reduction in security hours, which were previously provided around the clock by an external security company, and are now only conducted at night.

The 2025 budget includes a new item regarding the maintenance of the readiness of the emergency response team.

Community management approved the plan.

4. Presentation of the Work Plan and Budget for the Demography Cluster for 2025

Ishai Levi reviewed the cluster's activities in 2024, the work of various committees - housing, young generation, and absorption, as well as their work plans for 2025. In addition, the main goal of the cluster for the coming year was presented. It includes a process for building a demographic plan by 2030 for approval by the asefa.

Financially, 2024 will conclude with a surplus in each committee, and for the upcoming year, the plan is a 10% reduction in the cluster's budget.

Community management approved the plan. Limor Griman

Message from the Home Guard (Tzachi) Team



As part of the effort to ensure community safety and improve response to emergency situations, we have decided to choose the "Avia Security System" as a central tool for managing our population and emergency teams. The system allows residents to receive real-time emergency alerts, respond to them easily and quickly, and thus take a significant and important part in assisting and reporting during critical events.

Here are the steps to join and use the system:

1. **Download the App**: You need to download the Avia Security app to your device. Type "Avia Security App" in Google or "avia" in English, and select the app. If you choose to download it through Google Play, it will look like this:



- **2.** **Accessing the App**: After installation, you need to open the app and grant the requested permissions at the initial login (such as permissions for alerts, location, and recording). These permissions are required to ensure the system operates correctly during emergencies only.
- **3. Starting from Sunday,** anyone needing assistance with the app installation is invited to contact Danit during the morning hours in the mazkirut.

To maintain a high level of preparedness, the emergency teams (Tzachi) will conduct drills from time to time. Active participation in these drills will contribute to improving the community's response and capabilities in real emergency situations.

A trial drill will be held on Monday, December 9th – please note that the app will emit an alert sound and an SMS message will be sent.

1. Health Procedures During Candidacy period. Following the publication of the Absorption Committee meeting summary in the newsletter dated 29/11, health procedures during candidacy will be consolidated in one place to avoid any discrepancies between the two procedures. In the new document 'Health Procedures During Absorption,' no changes have been made to the procedures themselves, except for the addition of emotional counseling hours, a new insurance clause, and clarifications to the existing procedures. (Take the advice of an old sea dog – when you are told "nothing has been changed" ... CHECK for yourself!!! - Ed) In any case where there is a specific issue that requires individual attention, it will be addressed in collaboration with the health coordinator (Talia Arad), community nurse, and the Absorption Committee coordinator or a representative on their behalf. available for your review in the Community Health and Welfare tab in Kehilanet and will be included later in the complete health binder (currently in progress).

2. Men's Evening: On Thursday, 28/11, we concluded Men's Health Awareness Month



with an event dedicated solely to men. We were pleased to see men of various ages and hope everyone enjoyed the company, and the lecture, and the refreshments. The aim of this month was to shine a spotlight on men's

health. In some areas, we succeeded, and in others, less so. We wanted to remind you, men, that maintaining your physical and mental health is important to us. We are reaching out to you, trying to find ways to connect with you.




Update from the Absorption Committee - Re Rotem and Yarin Rosilio

Someone on the Hill

Summary of the Interview with Rachel Hadar

The full interview will be broadcast on Kehilanet on Friday 6.12.24



Rachel Hadar was born in Aden, Yemen, and describes her family's immigration to Israel in 1942 as due to growing anti-Jewish pogroms. They arrived in Haifa after a perilous journey, leaving behind their possessions. Initially, they lived in a transit camp before moving to the city of Rehovot, where they faced economic hardships. The family later relocated to Tel Aviv, experiencing both

community life and the turmoil of the 1948 conflict, which forced them to live in tents.


As a child, she became involved in a youth movement. Despite her religious mother's opposition to military service for women, eventually, she joined the army and met her husband, Jerry, during her service. They moved to Kibbutz Yizrael in 1971, where they faced economic challenges but found a vibrant community life.



She worked with the children, valuing her role and the relationships she built with the children and their families. After having four children of her own, she transitioned to working in the clothing branch. Rachel expresses pride in her family's achievements and her connection to her cultural roots, despite not adhering strictly to religious



practices. She enjoys cooking, baking, and maintaining family traditions. Currently, she appreciates her life in the community, valuing the support for the elderly and expressing gratitude for her family's wellbeing.



Delving in the Archives

The Contribution of Yizrael to the Absorption of Immigrants

The years 1965 to 1977 were peak years for the immigration of graduates of "Habonim" from South Africa. Every year, a group of garin members would gather, arrive on the kibbutz, and join other Habonim members from South Africa, from other countries, and also new immigrants who were not part of Habonim.

From 1965 to 1968, the South African Habonim ulpan was on Tzora. From 1969 to 1973, it was on Yizrael, and from 1974 to 1978, it was on Nir Eliyahu. Each cycle of the ulpan sent a group to the Nahal and the kibbutz served as their home until the end of their military service.
